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creased traffic congestion. Parking was a topic addressed by both supporters and opponents of the renovation project.

Bernie Herring, a Sacred Heart parishioner who lives next door to the cathedral on Flower City Park, praised the planned renovations. In particular, he welcomed a proposed 114-space parking lot behind the cathedral on land currently occupied by houses owned by the diocese. The diocese also proposed as an alternative in the draft statement



the possibility of scaling back the lot's size to build a one-third acre park designed to mitigate the lot's

"A well-designed and well-maintained parking lot will be a nice addition to the neighborhood," Herring

On the other hand, Ruth DeBoard, an in-home child-care provider who lives behind the cathedral on Ridgeway Avenue, said she was concerned that a new parking lot would worsen traffic congestion in an area in which many children live. She said her daughter and one of the children for whom she cares are asthmatic, and that she worries construction activity could create respiratory

Written comments from the public on the environmental impact of renovations are being taken until Aug. 22. Final approval or rejection of the renovation site plan by city zoning authorities may come this fall after a public hearing, according to Dorraine Laudisi, senior city planner.

Meanwhile, renovation opponents have asked that New York State Supreme Court Justice Robert J. Lunn annul the city planning commission's two 4-3 votes on June 24, which denied landmark status for the cathedral's exterior and interior. In May, Lunn ruled that the commission had to re-examine its October 2002 vote denying landmark status for the cathedral. Lunn's ruling came in response to a petition filed by the Sacred Heart Preservation Committee, the same group that filed the new petition.

In a petition filed July 11, the Sacred Heart Preservation Committee argued that the planning commission failed in June to comply with the city's landmark ordinance as well as Lunn's May ruling. Attorneys for all sides are slated to present arguments regarding the petition in court at 9:30 a.m. Aug. 28.
