During Bible times, parents believed children were blessings from God, and a family with many children was considered very blessed

Boys helped out with the chores or the family business, while girls helped their mothers.

After a day of work or school studies (usually only boys received training from teachers), they made time to play with their simple, home made toys or games. Stories about children in the Bible include Joseph and his

brothers; David's battle with Goliath, the giant; Samuel's call by God; and the birth of Jesus. Jesus often preached about how much he loved children and how important they were in God's kingdom.

St. Nicholas of Tolentino Nicholas of Tolentino was born in 1245 in Italy after his parents praved that God would bless them with children. His mother promised God that she would bring up her son to serve God

throughout his life. When he heard an inspiring sermon by an Augustinian friar, Nicholas decided to become a member of that order. He was accepted and studied theology in San Ginesio:

He was responsible for the food pantry of the order, which gave daily rations to the poor Nicholas was ordained a priest in 1270, and he served at many of the Augustinian friaries and mission sites. Motivated by a strong

"What were you arguing about on the way?"

The disciples did not answer Jesus. They did not know if he knew the answer already, but they were afraid to admit what was on their minds. Jesus did know. The disciples had been wondering which of them was the greatest disciple. When Jesus and his friends went to the dining room of the boarding house, there were other travelers there as well, some with children.

A man who recognized Jesus brought his family over to see him.


