Mercy high starts leadership search

Officials at Brighton's Our Lady of Mercy High School will soon be looking for a new president and principal. At the end of June 2004, Mercy Sister Carol Wulforst will retire as president and the school's first lay principal, Evelyn Kirst, will resign.

Sister Wulforst, who will have served as president for 14 years, has seen the school through many changes, including the implementation of the middle-school program, a new building addition and an ongoing capital campaign.

"I leave the school confident that our board will bring in a new team who will shape the future of Our Lady of Mercy and guide the school to the next level," she said in an Oct. 8 press release.

"Sister Carol is someone who is the heart of Mercy," Board of Trustees President Kathleen Cahill Murray said in an interview with the Catholic Courier. "She wants the best for Mercy ... She is just an incredibly gifted woman."

i-," Kirst has served in her position for nearly 10 years. Murray said Kirst has been responsible for incorporating the heritage and traditions of the Sisters of Mercy into the life of the faculty, staff, students and parents of the school. She noted that high-school principals today have to deal with many issues that past principals wouldn't have even dreamed of, adding that she has the utmost respect for Kirst.

In an interview with the Catholic Courier, Kirst said she has been working in school administration for almost 33 years. She said she isn't sure what she'll do after leaving Mercy, but believes the time is right to go.

"It's like an inner feeling, when you know that it's ready," Kirst said. "For the first time in my life I'm leaving one job without having another. (School administration) is what I know, but I like change."

Kirst is proud of her accomplishments at Mercy, but also thinks her resignation will give a new principal a chance to accomplish new things.
