Selfless gift center of story

Before the infant Jesus received gold, frankincense and myrrh from the Magi, he received something more practical — a blanket.

At least that's the story according to William A. Guiffre, author of The First Gift of Christmas, a hard-bound illustrated children's book released earlier this year by Coastal Publishing Inc. in Summerville, S.C. The book's main character is a boy named David, who Guiffre imagined was the son of the innkeeper who let Joseph and Mary sleep in his stable.

"It certainly is not contrary to the raditions of our church, but it is not based in fact," Guiffre told the Catholic Courier.

The story places the origin of Veronica's veil — reputedly used to wipe the bloody face of Jesus as he made his way to Calvary - in a blanket given to him by Veronica's 'brother," David, the character invented by Guiffre. The author said the story shows children that the baby Jesus they adore on Christmas grew up to face a painful fate.

"It's awfully easy to worship the Christ-child in the manger," Guiffre

said. "It's awfully difficult to worship Christ on his way to the cross because nobody likes unpleasantness. Yet, without the cross there would be no redemption."

In the book, when Joseph, Mary and the baby Jesus leave the stable, Mary gives David back the blanket. David subsequently uses the blanket to wrap his baby sister, Veronica. The girl grows up and keeps the blanket until she meets Jesus carrying his cross. Hence, the book notes that the first gift of Christmas "became the first gift of Easter."

A retired teacher and administrator who worked for several Monroe County school districts, Guiffre is also a former director of religious education at Our Lady Queen of Peace Parish in Brighton. He also served St. Patrick's Parish, Victor, in numerous roles, from lector and eucharistic minister to catechist and parish council member. The 69-yearold Guiffre and his wife. Ann. currently split their time living in Fourth Lake in the Adirondacks and on Kiawah Island in South Carolina.

The First Gift of Christmas has already received positive reviews from a number of readers, including

Bishop Matthew H. Clark and Bishop Robert J. Baker of the Diocese of Charleston, S.C.

"This book would be suitable for any young child, and it would be most appropriate at Christmastime when wanting and sharing gifts is sometimes difficult for youngsters," Bishop Clark wrote in his review.

"(T)his fictional story conveys a reminder that the life of Jesus impacted many more people and. events than were recorded in the Bible or are handed down to us by oral tradition." Bishop Baker wrote.

The First Gift of Christmas is Guiffre's third book for children, the other two being Gramma's Glasses and The Wrong Side of the Bed. Guiffre, a father and grandfather, said he particularly enjoys reading his stories to his grandchildren.

"The thrill of reading to your grandchildren a book that you wrote is just something I can't describe to you," he said.

Children won't be the only beneficiaries of The First Gift of Christmas, he said. If the book is ordered through the University of Rochester's Newman Community. which serves Catholic students, the

community will receive a portion of the proceeds from those sales. A university alumnus, Guiffre said he wanted to give back to the community that had sustained his faith.

"My faith has always been an absolutely crucial part of my life," Guiffre said. "(The Newman Community) was a nice support at a secular university."
