Father Leon John Hedges, who served as a priest of the Diocese of Rochester for more than 60 years, died on Jan. 16, 2004. He was 85.

A native of Hornell, Father Hedges was baptized and confirmed at St. Ann's Parish there. He attended St. Andrew's and St. Bernard's seminaries in Rochester, and was ordained on June 5, 1943.

Following ordination, Father Hedges served as assistant pastor at Immaculate Conception Parish in Ithaca from 1943-48. He worked there with Father John T. Walsh, currently priest-in-residence at Our Lady Queen of Peace Parish in Brighton. Like the priest's other friends, Father Walsh said he would remember Father Hedges for his sense of humor.

"I suppose most of us will remember him as always joshing or kidding." Father Walsh said. "I use that word because while he loved to embarrass me, he was always cautious not to belittle anyone."

In 1948, Father Hedges was named assistant pastor of Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary Parish in Brockport, Father William Graf, currently pastor of Church of the Res-

"He helped us laugh at ourselves and some of the situations we had to deal with," Father Graf said. "Jack's laughter could take away the sting of hurt and frustration.'

Both Fathers Walsh and Graf pointed out that Father Hedges had a deeply serious side, and counseled many a parishioner.

"He was always reading, going to conferences, and trying to learn so that he could preach better or become a better pastoral counselor,' Father Graf said.

In 1951, Father Hedges was named assistant pastor of Old St. Mary's Parish in Rochester. Then, in 1963, he was named chaplain of the University of Rochester's Newman Commu-



nity. He held that position he held until 1968, when he was appointed to his first pastorate at St. Charles Bor-1972 and again in 1977.

pastor of St. Helen's Parish in Gates, where he remained until his retirement in 1988. Following retirement, he lived at St. Joseph's Parish in Penfield, and then at the Sisters of Mercy Motherhouse in Brighton.
