PENN YAN — On a blustery March day, seven teens from Our Lady of the Lakes Catholic Community's junior-high youth group met in a garage to paint a large piece of plywood. They are among many other diocesan youth-group members and Catholic-school students who are creating colorful art to adorn the construction fence surrounding Rochester's Sacred Heart Cathedral.

In January, Father John Mulligan, Sacred Heart's pastor, called upon diocesan youths to be a part of the cathedral's renovation by painting 4by-8-foot plywood panels to be placed on the fence. The panels should be colorful and creative, depict local scenes and indicate what parish they are from, he said.

The panel decorated by Our Lady of the Lakes' youth group depicts an angel spreading her wings above the sun, which is rising over the Finger Lakes. Stars, the moon, a cross, a dove and a chalice are also depicted. "We just decided what we were

going to draw and each person did a part," said Stephen Groom, 14, as he painted green ivy on his brown cross.

The garage was quieter than normal for a room full of teenagers as the youth-group members worked, occasionally talking about the school play, French class and what color to paint the host, which was above the chalice.

In January the teens decided to take part in the project and were excited about the endeavor, said Jen Mosich, who leads the newly formed youth group. After brainstorming and drafting their ideas on paper, the teens sketched their final design onto the plywood at the end of February, she said, and hope to complete the panel by the end of March.

The youth group at Elmira's Our Lady of Lourdes Parish also participated in the project and finished their panel in February. At least 20

teens helped paint the board, which looked almost tie-dyed when they were done, said Rosemary Anthony, the youth-group leader.

"I wanted them all to make sure that they did something. If they didn't feel artistic, they could do splatter paint," said Anthony, who was pleased with the finished product because she feels it represents the teens. "Mostly, it's like they are. It's straight, but it's exceptionally colorful, and that's exactly what they are. They're direct, they're upfront, they're talented, they're colorful."

After they were done making the board colorful, the teens painted the name of the parish across it and added flowers, stars and a cross, said youth-group member Sarah Norton, 16.

"Everybody brought different kinds of paint and paint brushes,' Sarah said. "We really didn't plan out

how to paint the wood; we just started to paint. It was really fun. In the end, it looked like a blob of colors. It really seemed like something from the '60s to me."

The teens were excited that they had been asked to be a part of the. cathedral renovation, Anthony said, adding that it helped make them feel important and like they were part of the diocese as a whole. After finishing and delivering the panel, the teens received a letter of thanks from Father Mulligan. Hearing that positive feedback motivated them to



continue doing similar projects. Anthony said.
