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SEATTLE (CNS) - She has been interviewed on the "Today" show and on CNN about her effort to get a retail store to offer modest clothing for girls.

Newspapers and magazines around the country have spread her story

But has all the publicity given 11year-old Ella Gunderson of Redmond a big head?

"No. We've tried to wrap this whole thing in a lot of prayer to ward (it) off," said her mother, Pam.

Ella, who will be a sixth-grader at : Holy Family School in Kirkland this fall, said the newfound fame makes her uncomfortable.

"I don't really like it a whole ton," she told The Catholic Northwest Progress, newspaper of the Seattle Archdiocese.

But when pressed, she added that a positive side to the publicity has been "getting the word out."

By that she means that many girls would opt to wear more modest clothing, if only they could find it,

That was the thrust of a letter she wrote to Nordstrom last winter. She complained to the Seattle-based retailer that the clothes it sells for girls

- particularly the jeans she was interested in purchasing - were too tight and showed too much skin.

"I see all these girls who walk around with pants that show their belly button and underwear," she wrote. "Even at my age, I know that is not modest.'

She said that the clerk who was helping her suggested "there is only one look." If that is true, Ella added, then girls are supposed "to walk around half naked. I think that you should change that."

Her letter went all the way up to Pete Nordstrom, the store's executive vice president, and store officials promised that her concerns would be passed on to their buyers.

Ella's mother noted that people from all over the country have written letters of support, saying they've been inspired by what one person can accomplish by speaking up and hoped to write their own letters on issues of importance to them.

"What Ella says she's learned from all this is that you should speak up, because you might be heard," Pam Gunderson said. \*
