The prologue of the Catechism of the Catholic Church contains a simple, but quite profound statement about our beliefs, teachings and our mission as church and individual Catholics:

I am inspired by the idea that we must stand for, work for and devote our Christian energy "to arrive at love," the love embodied in Jesus Christ and the love we must have for each other as sisters and brothers in Christ.

That "love that never ends" — and the connection we share as children of God — is the idea behind the annual Thanks Giving Appeal, as well. Quite simply, as Catholics, we do it out of love.

Certainly our faith teaches us that love and charity are synonymous; indeed, the word "charity" is from the Latin caritas, or Christian love for one's fellow beings. In Scripture, the words are often used interchangeably, so closely are they linked by etymology, meaning and intent. For example, many of you are quite familiar with the oft-quoted writing of St. Paul in 1 Corinthians: "If I have prophetic powers, and understand all mysteries and all knowledge, and if I have all faith, so as to remove mountains, but have not love, I am nothing..." In the earliest English translations of Scriptures, such as the King James Version, the word "charity" is used in the verse instead of the word

"love."

And so, for a Christian, for the children of a generous' God, love and charity — helping each other and caring for one another — are inextricable.

In that spirit, we ask for your financial gifts in this year's Thanks Giving Appeal — the theme of which is Sharing Our Blessings ... and Changing Lives Forever — with this end in mind: to further the church's mission, to bring the light and love of Christ to as many people as we can possibly reach, to produce programs and ministries aimed at continuing and extending this "love that never ends."
